

# **Checklist for Organizing a River Cleanup**

FoRR organizes two cleanups each year: one in the spring and one in the fall. We are happy to have you join in these cleanups- please check <a href="https://www.friendsofthereedyriver.org/events">www.friendsofthereedyriver.org/events</a> to see the date of the next public cleanup.

Here are some steps and information to help should you wish to organize your own river cleanup.

## People

1. Determine the number and ages of your participants

#### River Location

- 1. Select an area that has a lot of trash!
- 2. Determine an access point to get into the river. Make certain that the riverbank is stable and has a low slope. Choose an area of the river where the water is clear and shallow enough to wade through.
- 3. Make sure your area is large enough to handle your volunteers. Sometimes multiple locations will be required.
- 4. Avoid locations with safety hazards, such as chemical containers or poison ivy.

### **Staging Logistics**

- 1. Select a meeting location, with adequate parking, where volunteers will check in, obtain supplies and directions to river access point.
- 2. If you are planning to access or clean the river on private property, you will need to get permission from the property owner prior to cleanup.

#### Equipment

- 1. Participants should wear clothing and footwear that can get wet and dirty.
- 2. Waders or boots are helpful if your volunteers plan to get in the river.
- 3. Gloves should be worn to protect hands from brush and sharp items.

- 4. Wear sunscreen and a hat.
- 5. Trash bags, grabbers, shovels and rope for use in trash collection.
- 6. First aid kit and bug spray
- 7. Signage to indicate river access and trash collection area

# Safety Speech

- 1. Keep your gloves and shoes on at all times throughout the cleanup.
- 2. Do not pick anything up that you are uncomfortable with. You are not required to remove every item.
- 3. Be careful with sharp items, as they can cut you and your trash bag. Have a bucket dedicated to be a "sharps" container for glass and other sharp items.
- 4. Do not empty containers that are sealed with liquid inside of them. It is better to have a heavier bag than allow these liquids to enter the water.
- 5. Keep in mind that items that are water and sediment-logged will be much heavier than they normally are. Use your common sense and ask for help when needed.
- 6. Have fun!!

#### Waivers

- 1. Your organization
- 2. Cooperating land owners and any participating organizations.
  - a. You can check the Greenville Parcel Map to see if your chosen section of the river is privately owned
- 3. City and County waivers. Please reach out to info@friendsofthereedyriver.org to obtain these.

#### **Public Assistance** (Trash Disposal and other assistance)

- 1. Contact the city or county (depending on your location) 2- 3 weeks prior to your cleanup and again the day before and after your event.
- 2. City of Greenville

    - i. This allows you to consolidate your trash in one area, take a photo and have County staff come by to collect it
